

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## Earth Day April 22, 2024

Earth Day is Mondy, April 22, 2022 and marks the 54th anniversary of this holiday. It's followed closely by Arbor Day, which falls on the last Friday in April.

Typically, Earth Day is assigned a different theme or area of focus each year; this year's theme is "plant vs plastics" with a commitment to end plastics for the sake of human and planetary health, demanding a 60% reduction in the production of all plastics by 2040 and an ultimate goal of building a plastic-free future for generations to come.

To achieve a 60% reduction by 2040, Earthday.org's goals are:

(1) promoting widespread public awareness of the damage done by plastic to human, animal, and all biodiversity's health and demanding more research be conducted on its health implications, including the release of any and all information regarding its effects to the public;

(2) rapidly phasing out all single use plastics by 2030 and achieving this phase out commitment in the United Nations Treaty on Plastic Pollution in 2024;

(3) demanding policies ending the scourge of fast fashion and the vast amount of plastic it produces and uses; and

(4) investing in innovative technologies and materials to build a plastic-free world. For Earth Day 2024, together, for everyone, everything, every day...

"The word environment means what surrounds you. In the case of plastics we have become the product itself – it flows through our blood stream, adheres to our internal organs, and carries with it heavy metals known to cause cancer and disease. Now this once-thought amazing and useful product has become something else, and our health and that of all other living creatures hangs in the balance," said Kathleen Rogers, President of EARTHDAY. ORG. "The Planet vs. Plastics campaign is a call to arms, a demand that we act now to end the scourge of plastics and safeguard the health of every living being upon our planet."

Plastics extend beyond an imminent environmental issue; they present a grave threat to human health as alarming as

climate change. As plastics break down into microplastics, they release toxic chemicals into our food and water sources and circulate through the air we breathe. Plastic production now has grown to more than 380 million tons per year. More plastic has been produced in the last ten years than in the entire 20th century, and the industry plans to grow explosively for the indefinite future.

• More than 500 billion plastic bags—one million bags per minute—were produced worldwide last year. Many plastic bags have a working life of a few minutes, followed by an afterlife of centuries. Even after plastics disintegrate, they remain as microplastics, minute particles permeating every niche of life on the planet.

• 100 billion plastic beverage containers were sold last year in the United States. That's more than 300 bottles per inhabitant. A few of them will be converted into park benches; none of them will be made into new plastic bottles and 95% of all plastics in the US won't be recycled at all. Even the 5% of plastics being recycled are "downcycling" to inferior products or shipped to poorer countries for "recycling," leaving the demand for virgin plastic undiminished.

People seldom think of water when they think of plastics. But making a plastic water bottle requires six times as much water as the bottle itself contains.

• The fast fashion industry annually produces over 100 billion garments. Overproduction and overconsumption have transformed the industry, leading to the disposability of fashion. People now buy 60% more clothing than 15 years ago, but each item is kept for only half as long.

Approximately 85% of garments end up in landfills or incinerators, with only 1% being recycled. Nearly 70% of clothing is made from crude oil, resulting in the release of dangerous microfibers when washed and continued contribution to long-term pollution in landfills.

Passover 2024 will begin in the evening of Monday, April 22 and ends in the evening of Tuesday, April 30

The eight-day festival of Passover is celebrated in the early spring, from the 22 to 30. month of Nissan 15-22, 5784.

Passover (Pesach) commemorates the emancipation of the Israelites from slavery in ancient Egypt.

It begins with a Jewish ritual service and ceremonial dinner for the first night or first two nights of Passover called Passover Seder

The Hebrew word "Seder" translates to "order," and the Passover seder is a home ritual blending religious rituals, food, song and storytelling.

Seder customs include telling the story, discussing the story, drinking four cups of wine, eating matzah, partaking of symbolic foods placed on the Passover Seder Plate, and reclining in celebration of freedom. The Seder is the most commonly celebrated Jewish ritual, performed by Jews all over the world.

Pesach is observed by avoiding leaven, and highlighted by the Seder meals that include four cups of wine, eating matzah and bitter herbs, and retelling the story of the Exodus.

In Hebrew it is known as Pesach (which means "to pass over"), because God passed over the Jewish homes when killing the Egyptian firstborn on the very first Passover eve.

## The Passover Story in a Nutshell

After many decades of slavery to the Egyptian pharaohs, during which time the Israelites were subjected to backbreaking labor and unbearable horrors,

God saw the people's distress and sent Moses to Pharaoh with a message: "Send forth My people, so that they may serve Me."

But despite numerous warnings, Pharaoh refused to

heed God's command. God then sent upon Egypt ten devastating plagues, afflicting them and destroying everything from their livestock to their crops.

At the stroke of midnight of 15 Nissan in the year 2448 from creation (1313 BCE), God visited the last of the ten plagues on the Egyptians, killing all their firstborn.

While doing so, God spared the children of Israel, "passing over" their homes—hence the name of the holiday.

Pharaoh's resistance was broken, and he virtually chased his former slaves out of the land. The Israelites left in such a hurry, in fact, that the bread they baked as provisions for the way did not have time to rise.

Six hundred thousand adult males, plus many more women and children, left Egypt on that day and began the trek to Mount Sinai and their birth as God's chosen people.

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## Ramadan 2024

Ramadan began at sundown on Monday, March 11 and ends at sundown on Wednesday, April 10.

Ramadan is a holy month dedicated to fasting, time with loved ones, reflection, charity and prayer. It is one of the five pillars of Islam.

This year, Ramadan began at the first sighting of the crescent Moon (according to Saudi Arabia), on the evening of Sunday, March 10, 2024.

Ramadan is an opportunity given by the Gracious Creator for His servants to come close to Him, seek forgiveness for their sins, and fulfill their religious duties.

It is considered a holy month that honors the time when Allah, via the angel Gabriel, revealed the first verses of the Qur'an, the holy book of Islam, to a caravan trader named Muhammad. and told him he was in charge of carrying God's message.

As per the scriptures, Muslims believe that all the devils are locked up with chains in hell during Ramadan and no one can disturb those who are busy praying to Allah as the gates of Jannah (Paradise) are opened and the gates of Jahannum (hell) are locked up along with the devils.

The holiest night of Ramadan is Laylat al-Qadr, known as the "Night of Power." It is

observed as a night for reflection, prayer and good deeds.

Beginning at puberty, all Muslims (with certain exceptions), take part in the monthlong, dawn-to-sunset fast.

Fasting is one of the pillars of Islam. Muslims believe that fasting cleanses the body, and the practice reminds them of the suffering of the poor. Whoever denies this obligation of fasting during Ramadan does not remain a Muslim.

"Thawab" is what the spiritual rewards of fasting are known as and it is believed that these rewards multiply during Ramadan, where Muslims stay away from food and drink, smoking, sexual activities and any sinful behaviour, and instead focus more on prayer, self-reform, charity and taqwa, which is heightened awareness of God.

Muslims let go of worldly pleasures and extravagant behaviour and spending and observe the fast along with their friends and family.

Eating and drinking (including water) is prohibited from dawn to sunset, and the day's abstinence is offset by a pre-dawn meal called sehri and a nightly meal known as iftar.

They wake up in the early

hours of the morning to eat Suhoor or Sehri, a meal which comprises of foods such as dates, fruits, milk, sweet vermicelli etc.

In the evening, Muslims traditionally break their fast with dates or anything sweet or simply consume water. This is marked by the Maghrib prayer and it is believed that even Prophet Muhammad broke his fast with dates-according to some legends, he had three dates and some water.

During Ramadan, it is customary for Muslims to pray extra nightly prayers and participate in other religious practices throughout the day and night, when possible.

Charity becomes even more important. It is a way to purify your wealth. In Ramadan, all good deeds are rewarded more than in any other month of the year.

Foods traditionally served at iftar vary, but food is often shared with a poor family during Ramadan.

Ramadan ends (about April 9) with Eid al-Fitr, also known as the Festival of Sweets or Festival of Breaking the Fast.

It marks the end of the monthlong dawn-to-sunset fasting. Eid al-Fitr celebrations vary, but often include spending time with family and friends, gift-giving, charitable giving and festivals with food and activities. *Various sources*.

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


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#### **Full Pink Moon**

According to the "Farmer's Almanac," this name came from the herb, moss pink, or wild ground phlox, which is one of the earliest widespread flowers of the spring.

Other names include the "Full Sprouting Grass Moon," the "Egg Moon," and, among Coastal tribes, the "Full Fish Moon," because this was the time that the shad swam upstream to spawn.

The Native American Indians of the northern and eastern United States kept track of the seasons by giving a name to each recurring full moon. European settlers followed the custom. ###

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#### Historically Speaking

#### **April**

April is derived from the Latin Aprilis. It is named for the Greek goddess Aphrodite.

It is ironic that a month honoring the Greek goddess of love, would have three wars begin, that would define our country.

 Colonial militias, in Massachusetts, were collecting military supplies. This included two cannon that they had "liberated" from a British depot. Much of their equipment was stored at the town of Concord.

British troops planned a night raid on Concord to recapture the cannons, destroy the supplies, arrest John Hancock and Samuel Adams. The British considered Hancock and Adams troublemakers. However, their plans became known to the colonists and most of the stores in Concord were moved to other locations.

On the night of April 18, 1775, seven hundred British regulars left Boston, heading toward Concord.

Paul Revere and William Dawes rode out of Boston to warn the Patriots. Hancock and Adams, then in Lexington, escaped. Along the route, Revere and Dawes alerted local militias. Riders were then sent out to alert towns nearby.

Then Revere and Dawes met Samuel Prescott, who joined them. Revere was stopped by a British patrol. His horse was confiscated. Dawes, in an effort to escape, was unhorsed by a tree limb. Prescott did reach Concord to warn the patriots.

On the morning of April 19, some 70-militia formed up on the green in Lexington. Although they were not in the line of march of the British, two companies of light infantry, under the command of Major Pitcairn, went to disperse the militia.

As the militia were in the act of dispersing, a shot rang out, No one knows who fired first. The British troops fired two volleys and charged with bayonets, killing eight and wounding nine.

When the British troops arrived at Concord, they found little in the way of military stores. They burned what they

Colonial militiamen had come together at the North Bridge, just outside of the town. On seeing the smoke, they assumed that the British had torched the town. They advanced and opened fire on the British.

The British troops were hounded and chased all the way back to Boston by some 2,000 militiamen. British losses were about 200 killed, wounded or missing. The militiamen losses were less than 90. The war would last eight years. From this point forward, we would

become the United States of America.

• On the morning of April 12, 1861, Confederate gun batteries opened fire on Fort Sumter. This was the start of the American Civil War. After over 500,000 American deaths, the war ended on April 9, 1865. This war preserved the Union and ended slavery.

• On April 6, 1917, the United States entered World War I. The war would end on November 11, 1918. American losses were 320,518 killed, wounded or missing.

On a cheerful note, the USS NEW JERSEY SSN 796 (See The Gazette Newspaper, September, 2022), will be commissioned on April 6, 2024, at US Naval Weapons Station Earle in Leonardo, NJ. ###

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
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## Let's Go Traveling!

#### Icon of the Seas

American society has an unending appetite for all things, new, bigger, and better.

Royal Caribbean International has regularly fed that hunger by building ships that push the boundaries of naval engineering. When the line introduced the former Sovereign of the Seas at over 70,000 GRT (Gross Registered Tonnage, a measure of enclosed space) with a guest capacity of over 2000 in 1998, cynics proclaimed that the line would never fill the ship on a regular basis. Since then, ships of all lines have continued to grow.

Recently, Royal Caribbean introduced the newest World's Largest Ship, Icon of the Seas at 250,000 GRT. The ship measures 1,197.5 feet in length, 159 feet in width and is 20 decks high. There are 2,805 staterooms accommodating a maximum of 7,514 guests.

This vessel offers several new features and upgrades to familiar facilities of other ships in the fleet.

There are over 20 food venues throughout the Icon of the Seas. Some are included in the initial price, while others have a surcharge of varying costs.

The options run the gamut of traditional dining rooms, Windjammer Marketplace

Specialty dining features include Empire Supper Club with entertainment while dining, Chops Grill, Giovanni's, Hooked Seafood, and Izumi Hibachi and Sushi. There are also 30 bars spread throughout the ship.

Icon of the Seas is divided into eight neighborhoods, there are a record seven pools spread throughout several of these.

First is Surfside, which is designed for families with young children featuring Splashaway Bay aquapark. The next neighborhood, Thrill Island, features a new record of six waterslides at sea. The Hideaway is an adults-only area with an Infiniti pool cantilevered over Surfside with a beach club vibe. Chill Island, a multi-deck pool area featuring the largest pool at sea (40,000 gallons) and Swim and Tonic, the largest swim-up bar at sea.

The Royal Promenade is the heart of the ship, featuring food and beverage outlets, shopping, entertainment venues, and front desk functions.

Central Park is an outdoor extension of the Royal Promenade with an alfresco setting of green at sea. For guests in higher category accommodations is the Suite Neighborhood, located in a secluded area, with enhanced amenities like the Coastal Kitchen Restaurant and The Grove.

Lastly, is the new Aqua-Dome at the front of Icon of the Seas. Here, the water show featured on other ships has moved indoors to a space featuring a five-story waterfall in the center of the dome. Within this neighborhood are also dining venues and a relaxation area with sweeping views of the sea.

Activities and entertainment are plentiful aboard Icon of the Seas. New is the Crown's Edge, a fear-inducing challenge that's part skywalk, part ropes course, and part thrill ride. This new option joins the afore

mentioned waterslides, rockclimbing wall, and familiar Flowrider surfing simulator to challenge one's courage.

Shows in the Royal Theater include "The Wizard of OZ" and other productions for the large stage, along with a 16-piece orchestra. Other choices include ice shows, a comedy club, dedicated Karaoke venue, dueling piano bar, Jazz and Blues Club, and Music Hall for special appearances. Of course, there is a large casino for adult enjoyment.

The Icon of the Seas features a total of 28 categories of accommodations, half of which are new.

The choices range from an interior room (no window) through the Ultimate Family Townhouse with room for eight guests, an in-suite slide, and musical stairs. One of the new categories is the Family Infinite Ocean View Balcony. This room features an indoor/ outdoor balcony and lodging for six. Accessible options are spread throughout the various choices.

The World's Largest Ship is now sailing every Saturday from Miami on alternating Eastern Caribbean and Western Caribbean itineraries. A sister ship, the Star of the Seas, is already under construction, and is set to debut during late summer of 2025. A third yet unnamed vessel is also on the horizon.

There are many ports that cannot accommodate a vessel of this size because of the number of passengers, harbor size or other barriers. The Verrazzano Narrows Bridge will prevent the ship from embarking at Cape Liberty in Bayonne.

The new ship has already proven extremely popular with most of the departures for 2024 sold-out or nearing capacity. The notably premium rates being charged has not dampened the appetite for bookings by the American cruiser. If you are thinking about a cruise aboard the Icon, act now.

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#### Airbnb: For You, Homeowner?

Some of the most popular lodging choices for visitors to Manhattan are not actually found in New York City. They're in New Jersey, just across the Hudson River where Airbnb and other home-sharing sites are booming, attracting travelers seeking less expensive places to stay.

Much of this phenomenon occurs in Hudson County, which is among the top 30 revenue-generating counties in the nation for Airbnb hosts.

But a lot of the listings posted by "the world's largest community-driven hospitality company" are in our County also, especially here in south central Bergen where the NYC commute is short and quick.

Airbnb's aim is to match two kinds of people together: those who have empty beds or houses that aren't being used, and those who need a place to stay while on business or vacation.

Airbnb isn't really designed for people who want a bed for a night – a hotel would probably suit them better. What it offers, rather, is place for travelers to lodge for several days/weeks in a row. For the property owner who has extra space that's not being used, it's a way to loan it out to people who need somewhere to stay for a few nights.

As a homeowner, think about how much of your home is basically going unused. Most people need just a few parts of their home – a spot to watch TV, a spot to sleep, a spot to cook and eat and maybe, if working from home, a spot to

Plotting the location of family members in a typical house, researchers have found that people hung out in the kitchen or family room most of the time. All other rooms were basically unused.

Think of energy costs. A lot of the time, you're not paying to heat or cool yourself. Instead, you're paying to heat and cool stuff that's sitting in unused rooms. These empty rooms might be used to generate income if you were inclined to loan them out.

Your home is likely your biggest asset. And figuring out a way to monetize it, even just a little bit, is an easy way to put that asset to use and defray some of your living costs. It's also a good way to fix the problem of having a house that's too big for you by making sure that unused space gets used.

Airbnb has at least three different hosting options that you can research online. But before you do, it might be wise first to check with authorities to see if the Airbnb concept is legal in your town. Some communities are cracking down on Airbnb usage.

This is because the service it provides is technically shortterm renting, and with it comes its own web of legal issues. Some unfortunate homeowners have met legal trouble after they unknowingly let out their properties without realizing it's unlawful in their towns to do so. It's happened in East Rutherford and Lyndhurst recently.

Here also is further advice that potential Airbnb hosts would be wise to heed...

• Check with your associa-

tion if you own a condominium. Many have deed restrictions or policies about renting out a property to short-term tenants.

- Check with your lender to make sure you don't have any restrictions on your mortgage note that might prevent you from participating as a temporary renter.
- · Check with your insurance company. Some homeowner's insurance policies have short-term rental coverage built in. But if you're committed to Airbnb for the long haul, you may have to purchase longterm coverage used for hotels and bed & breakfasts.
- And lastly, check with your bank account. This may be most important. As a realtor, I urge our buyers not to purchase more of a home that they can handle in some expectation that some of it can be rented out in the future. This is a recipe for financial disaster...

#### **Five Signs Your Child May Have a Foot Problem**

Foot and ankle problems in children often go unnoticed. Signs and symptoms can be subtle, and sometimes children can't explain what's wrong. But it's important to protect growing feet and have problems checked out early. Here are five warning signs parents should watch for.

#### 1. Your Kids Can't Keep **Up with Their Peers**

If children lag behind in sports or backyard play, it may be because their feet or legs are tired. Fatigue is common when children have flat feet. The muscles in the feet and legs tire easily because the feet are not functioning as well as they should.

#### 2. Children Voluntarily Withdraw from Activities They Usually Enjoy

If they are reluctant to participate, it may be due to heel pain — a problem often seen in children between the ages of 8 and 14. Repetitive stress from sports may cause muscle strain and inflammation of the growth plate, a weak area at the back of a child's heel.

#### 3. They Don't Want to **Show You Their Feet**

Children may feel pain or notice a change in the appearance of their feet or nails but don't tell their parents because they fear a trip to the doctor's office. We encourage parents to make a habit of inspecting their child's feet starting at a young age. Look for any changes such as calluses, growths, skin

discoloration, or redness and swelling around the toenails.

#### 4. Your Child Often **Trips and Falls**

Repeated clumsiness may be a sign of in-toeing, balance problems or neuromuscular conditions.

#### **5.** The Child Complains of Pain

It is never normal for a child to have foot pain. Injuries may seem minor, but if pain or swelling last more than a few days, have your child's foot examined.

If you've noticed any of these signs in your children, call your local podiatrist for an assessment.

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## Filling You In

#### Can a dental bridge get you where you want to be?

An empty space, or gap, in your smile may affect your chewing and speaking abilities, as well as your self-confidence.

If you're missing one or more teeth, your dentist may recommend a fixed bridge as a treatment option.

#### What is a bridge?

A fixed bridge is a dental appliance that replaces one or more missing teeth, thus bridging the space between the two adjacent natural teeth or implants. Bridges are made from gold, alloys, porcelain or a combination of these materials.

A traditional fixed bridge consists of a false tooth or teeth fused between two crowns, or caps, that are cemented on the

surrounding teeth. An implant bridge is fastened to two or more implants that are submerged in the bone tissue.

Bridges are sometimes called "fixed partial dentures." However, unlike removable partial dentures, bridges cannot be removed by the patient.

#### Why should I get a bridge?

If you are missing any teeth, the resulting space could cause speech or chewing problems. Missing teeth also can cause your remaining teeth to move out of position.

This repositioning can make you more susceptible to tooth decay and gum disease, which can cause further tooth loss. A fixed bridge can replace those missing teeth, correcting your bite, and improving your chewing and speaking abilities. A bridge also can help to maintain the natural shape of your face.

#### What is the total treatment time?

There are several steps required and several dental visits needed in order for your dentist to create a bridge that meets both your functional and esthetic needs. The total treatment time for a bridge is usually two to four weeks, depending on the type of bridge you receive.

#### How do I care for a bridge?

The success of a bridge depends on its foundation the abutment teeth or implants — so it's vital for patients with bridges to maintain their oral health. If you have a bridge, it's more important than ever to brush for two minutes, twice a day, and to see your dentist every six months. Your dentist also might recommend that you use floss threaders to reach the spaces between the bridge and the adjacent teeth and gums. With proper care, your fixed bridge should last as long as eight to 10 years or even longer.

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
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
