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



Do You Deserve a Medal?

When I was discharged from the Army, I just wanted to get back home. I did not care about any medals that were awarded to me. Last year, in October, I reviewed my DD-214. It stated that I earned the Good Conduct and the National Defense Service medals. I never received them.

Thinking that I would like to pass them down to my grand-

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children, I toyed with the idea of going to an Army/Navy store or purchasing them from an online supplier.

While I was looking online, I came across information that stated the National Archives can begin the process to receive missing medals and DD-214s.

I went to www.archives. gov/veterans/replace-medals. html. I followed the instructions and submitted the required information. I was given a case number. Using this number, I could follow the status of my request.

This past February, I received an email stating that the National Archives has authorized the US Army to issue these medals. A follow up, with a claim number, revealed that the medals are expected to be shipped in the month of June.

If you, a family member or friend deserves a medal? The service is free to Veterans. Next of kin requests depend on the service. Army, Navy and Marine Corps medals are free. Air Force and Coast Guard state that you purchase them.

If you feel that you should receive a specific medal and it is not on your DD-214, you can contact your US Congressman's office. They have staff members to assist you.

A case in point is the Korean Defense Medal. President Bush, in 2002, authorized this medal. Anyone who served in Korea for 30 continuous days or 60 intermittent days is eligible. It is awarded for the time period from July 28, 1954 to the present. Anyone who left the service before 2002, would not have this medal on their DD-214.

Speaking of the DD-214, if you lost or misplaced it, you can request an official copy.

In addition, you may request your Official Military Personnel File (AKA 201 File).

You must fill out and submit NARA Standard Form 180. This can be downloaded from their website. The instructions with the form explain where it should be sent.

However, due to a fire at the St. Louis NARA Records Center, in 1973, most of the files for Army and Air Force personnel from 1912 to 1964, were destroyed. Since 1974 there has been an attempt to reconstruct many of the damaged and burnt files. Pay records and unit morning reports still exist. ###





On Friday, April 8, 2022, at 2:34 p.m., the Secaucus Volunteer Fire Department was dispatched to 777 South Street, Secaucus, NJ 07094 (The Elms, the senior citizens. complex) for multiple reported smoke alarms on the 4th Floor, South Side.

Battalion 1, Lawrence Marciano arrived on the scene giving the initial size-up andestablishing command. Within seconds, Car 1 (Chief of the Department), Joseph W. Schoendorf arrived on the scene and assumed command. Battalion 1

made his way to the 4th Floor to investigate the smoke alarm activations.

Upon entrance to the floor, Battalion 1 noted heavy smoke in the hallway originating from apartment '406. Ladder 1 arrived on the scene and brought forcible entry tools and a High-Rise Pack to the fire floor. After deploying the hose line, Firefighter Donald Cieciuch and Battalion 1 forced entry to the apartment, saw heavy smoke and controlled the door.

the South Bergen Municipal Joint Insurance Fund (South Bergen JIF) will receive Safety Awards totaling \$20,000 for their efforts and participation in the South Bergen JIF's annual Safety Incentive Program.

Since 1991, the JIF has reduced its accident rate from 6.35 lost time accidents per 100 employees to last year's 2.22. The safety program focuses on lowering the risks associated with municipal operations such as police, fire, public works, and recreational facilities.

Formed in 1986, the South Bergen JIF has allowed municipalities from southern Bergen County to collectively pool their resources saving taxpayers millions of dollars.

By maintaining a very low overhead and using extensive loss control, risk management and claims management techniques the South Bergen JIF has proven to be a valuable resource for towns and is one of the most successful examples of inter-local cooperation in the history of the State.

South Bergen JIF Safety Committee Chairman, Robert Kakoleski (Rutherford Borough), emphasizes the importance of the Safety Program and that it was a privilege for municipalities in southern Bergen County to be associated with the JIF while realizing millions of dollars in savings over the past 38 years.

South Bergen JIF Executive Committee Chairman, Gregory Franz (Edgewater Borough), points out that having a strong Safety Program not

III, and Firefighter Eric Kosky arrived on the 4th Floor. Firefighter Kosky and Firefighter Cieciuch made entry into the fire apartment and performed a primary search.

During the search, the two came across a victim within feet of the apartment door. Firefighter Kosky, Firefighter Cieciuch, and Lieutenant Paone III removed the occupant from the smoke-filled apartment, into the hallway.

Once the victim was brought to the hallway, Lieutenant Victor Paone III made the haste and appropriate decision to apply his SCBA Face Mask to the victim, supplying him with fresh breathing air.

During this action, Battalion 1 confirmed the Working Fire, assisted with victim removal, and organized fire floor operations. After bringing the victim to the nearby, south stairwell, the team was met by Firefighter Victor Paone IV, Firefighter Sean Logan, Ex-Chief Carl Leppin III, and Captain Troy Conville.

The members then brought the victim down four flights of stairs and turned the victim over to the Hudson Regional Hospital Emergency Services.

During this process, Battalion 1 was joined by Deputy 1, Fred Schneider, and several members from Engine 2, Tower 2, and Rescue 1 and extinguished the fire.

Additionally, Mutual Aid from the Lyndhurst, Rutherford, and Jersey City Fire Departments assisted with operations. Interior crews performed extensive overhaul. All units gathered their resources and manpower and were put into service.

The scene was turned over to the Secaucus Fire Prevention Bureau, the Hudson County Prosecutor's Office, and the Secaucus Police Department for further investigation. Command was terminated by Car 1, Joseph W. Schoendorf with Fire Department operations concluding at 4:29 p.m. ###

Bayonne Man Charged with Robbery, Aggravated Assault and Theft

Bergen County Prosecutor Mark Musella announced the arrest of YASSINE G. RAHI, 18, of Bayonne, NJ for robbery, aggravated assault, leaving the scene of an accident resulting in serious bodily injury, endangering an injured victim, and theft by unlawful taking.

The arrest is the result of an investigation conducted by the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office Major Crimes Unit and the Moonachie Police Department.

On Wednesday, March 20, 2024, at approximately 4:58 p.m., the Moonachie Police Department responded to Avenue C in Moonachie, NJ for a reported hit-and-run.

Responding officers located a 22-year-old victim with serious bodily injury who was struck by an unknown suspect operating a vehicle that sped from the scene after robbing the victim during a pre-arranged Facebook Marketplace transaction.

Officers learned that the victim met with the suspect intending to purchase a Play-Station 5 video game console.

The Moonachie Police Department notified the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office Major Crimes Unit, and a joint investigation was initiated.

They identified a pattern of unsolved Facebook Marketplace robberies in northern New Jersey that involved fictitious Facebook accounts selling PlayStation 5 video game consoles. The user of these Facebook accounts would advertise a sale of the video game system and arrange a meeting.

When it came time for the in-person transaction, the suspect would rob the victims.

A coordinated effort involving multiple law enforcement agencies in northern New Jersey identified YASSINE G. RAHI as the individual who robbed the victim of \$275 and struck the victim with his getaway vehicle while fleeing.

RAHI was arrested in Bayonne, NJ on April 4, 2024 by detectives from the Bergen County Prosecutor's Office, the Moonachie Police Department, the Ridgefield Park Police Department, and the Guttenberg Police Department.

Prosecutor Mark Musella further noted about such online transactions: "Whether or not you conduct an online transaction at a 'Safe Exchange Zone,' always meet in public, well-lit areas, and never meet a stranger alone. Trust your instincts – if something feels off or too good to be true, it likely is.

Additionally, report any suspicious activity or encounters to your local police without delay. By remaining vigilant and taking necessary precautions, we can help safeguard ourselves and our communities. Provided by Bergen County Prosecutor's Office. ###

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

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Filling You In

Do you have **Dental Anxiety?**

Going to the dentist can cause anxiety, and that's a normal reaction.

It's estimated that between 15 and 40 percent of people are affected by dental anxiety. If not addressed, dental anxiety can lead to unnecessary oral health problems as a result of avoidance behavior, which can ultimately lead to more time spent in the dental chair to receive more extensive and potentially costly treatment.

Why do people experience dental related anxiety?

There are many causes of dental anxiety:

- The fear of pain
- Feeling as if you are not in control or are helpless
- · Feeling embarrassed about the condition of your teeth

- Recalling your own past experiences or the experiences of your family and friends
- The fear of needles, drills and gagging
- Anticipating costly and/ or extensive treatment

What can I do to alleviate dental anxiety?

• Talk with your dentist. He or she can help dispel any negative or frightening perceptions you may have. Having an understanding of your dental health and the dental services or treatment that you and your dentist have discussed and decided upon will help to relieve dental anxiety. Ask questions,

and request informational materials.

- Avoid caffeine and sugar before a dental appointment; they may make you anxious.
- Schedule dental appointments early in the day, before you have the chance to become stressed or rushed.
- Focus on relaxing. Breathe regularly and slowly during the procedure. When you are nervous you tend to hold your breath, which decreases oxygen levels and further increases feelings of panic.
- Use hand signals to inform the dentist when you are uncomfortable.

Alternatively, there are

medications or sedation which can help only if the previous strategies are unsuccessful.

Regular six-month preventive checkups help detect oral health problems early and acquaint you with the dental office and procedures you may feel anxious about.

Remember: When it comes to dental anxiety, knowledge is the greatest defense.

Prevent Your Child From Getting Painful **Ingrown Toenails**

Parents can prevent this common childhood foot problem by following some simple recommendations.

Ingrown toenails are one of the most frequent conditions we treat in children. Many kids hide their ingrown toenails from their parents, even though the condition can cause significant pain. An ingrown nail can break the skin and lead to dangerous infections.

Most podiatrists agree that tight shoes, tight socks and incorrect nail trimming for most cases. In others, the children may inherit the tendency for nails to curve or had previous trauma to the nail.

Teach children how to trim their toenails properly. Trim toenails in a fairly straight line, and don't cut them too short.

Make sure children's shoes fit. Shoe width is more important than length. Make sure that the widest part of the shoe matches the widest part of your child's foot.

If a child develops a painful ingrown toenail, reduce the inflammation by soaking the child's foot in room-temperature water and gently massaging the side of the nail fold.

The only proper way to treat a child's ingrown toenail is with a minor surgical procedure at a doctor's office. Parents should never try to dig the nail out or cut it off. These dangerous "bathroom surgeries" carry a high risk for infection. Your doctor may prescribe antibiotics to children with infected ingrown toenails.

If your child develops an ingrown, don't hesitate to contact your local podiatrist for help.

Mosquito Season is Abuzz Standing water means you keep out rain water

could be raising mosquitoes!

Many generations of mosquitoes can breed right in your own yard. All mosquitoes need water to complete their life cycle. Mosquitoes also are not known to travel long distances from their water source.

Some mosquitoes lay their eggs in standing water where they hatch in just a day or two. They can do this in water that has been standing for as little as four days.

Other mosquitoes may lay their eggs in old tires, tin cans, or other water-holding containers including bird baths, wading and small swimming pools, ornamental ponds, clogged gutters, flowerpots or the drip plates beneath them, cups, glasses, drink cans, etc.

The eggs may remain unhatched for weeks or even months until they are covered with water!

Yard and home checklist:

- Get rid of old tires, tin cans, buckets, drums, bottles, or any water holding containers
- Fill in or drain any low places (puddles, ruts) in yard
- Keep drains, ditches, and culverts clean of weeds and trash so water will drain properly
 - Cover trash containers to

- Repair leaky pipes and outdoor faucets
- Empty plastic wading pool at least once a week and store it indoors when not in use
- Make sure your backyard pool is properly cared for while on vacation
- Fill in tree rot holes and hollow stumps that hold water with sand or concrete
- Change the water in bird baths and plant pots or drip trays at least once a week
- Keep grass cut short and shrubbery well trimmed around the house so adult mosquitoes will not hide there
- · Keep gutters clean and free of debris and leaves.
- · Store boats covered or upside down.

Protect yourself from mosquito bites

- If possible, avoid being outdoors in the early morning or in the evening.
- If you must go out, wear long-sleeved shirts, long pants and socks.
- The EPA and CDC advise the use of a mosquito repellant, following the instructions on the label.
- Check with your pediatrician before using a repellant on children.
 - Keep windows and doors

closed or covered with screens to prevent mosquitoes from entering the house.

- Repair screens on windows, doors, porches, and patios.
- Some mosquito control methods do not do a very good job. For example, bug zappers do not work well to control biting mosquitos since they do not emit carbon dioxide.
- Various birds and bats will eat mosquitos, but there is little evidence that this cuts down on the number of mosquitos around homes.
- Electronic mosquito repelling devices don't stop mosquitos biting people either. ###




